Shortly after leaving the NTSB Communications Center, Roberto was requested by the Federal Government to participate in the creation of the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) for the Department of Homeland Security, at the time Department of Transportation. Roberto was involved in planning & developing studies for programs against terrorism on all 450 Federalized Airports in the United States. His oversight as a TSA employee included, the threat, vulnerability, consequence and intelligence for studies of substantive functions to improve the overall security mission of preventing and protecting the traveling public of the United States. In 2010, he started his own video production company out of Fairfax Virginia and currently utilizing his transportation background in order to achieve high-quality international level video production and working on investigative animation and video productions to assist multiple entities with their

Paul Voorhees - First thanks to Jim for putting together the newsletter so we can hear about what our former colleagues have been up to. Having worked for many different Federal agencies, it's clear that the Board was more of a family than any other place I experienced. Although my time at the Board was limited (3 years in the early 80's and 4 more in the late 90's), it was a great experience, and I've often expounded to others on how the party process the Board employs should be used in other industries to improve safety. When I retired at the end of 2003, we moved back to Washington State to a map dot called Seabeck that sported an amazing view of Hood Canal and the Olympic mountains. There and in the Seattle area, I spent several years volunteering in health care as a consumer representative. I found that medical mistakes were usually swept under the rug in fear of legal action rather than trying to find a way to focus on preventing recurrence. Some progress has been made through improved reporting for things such as hospital acquired infections (which killed about 99,000 people in 2002 according to the CDC). Still lots of room for improvement.

Needless to say, retirement has been, and continues to be and amazing journey. We've especially enjoyed traveling to the South Pacific, Europe and South Africa; the latter really needs to be on everyone's bucket list. Kruger Park is truly amazing. If you go, be sure to read Mandela's Long Walk to Freedom, and Michener's The Covenant to get a real appreciation of the history and culture.
