This from **Dennis Jones**, Acting Managing Director – thru **Lorenda**: I am pleased to announce the appointment of **Timothy LeBaron** as the Deputy Director for Regional Operations, Office of Aviation Safety (AS).

Tim joined the NTSB in 2003, as a non-paid Investigative Assistant in the Western Pacific Region, Seattle, Washington. During his 14-year tenure at the NTSB he has held various investigator positions including Senior Air Safety Investigator in the Central Region and Senior Aviation Accident Investigator in the Major Investigations Division in Washington, D.C. As a highly experienced investigator-in-charge (IIC), he has led over 300 general aviation accidents across the lower 48 states (from the East Coast to the West Coast) and up to Alaska. In addition, Tim has represented the United States in airline accidents around the world to include, Afghanistan, Russia, Japan, Turkey, and the United Arab Emirates.

Prior to joining the Safety Board, Tim was an Assistant Professor at Vincennes University, Indianapolis, Indiana where he lectured and provided hands on training to future aircraft maintenance technicians.

He holds a Bachelor of Aeronautical Technology degree from Purdue University and a Master of Aeronautical Science degree from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University. As an active pilot, he holds a commercial pilot certificate for single-engine land, single-engine sea, multi-engine land, and an instrument rating. He also has an Airframe and Powerplant technician certificate with Inspection Authorization.
