This from **Ray Smith**: I've deleted the last message you sent that said someone wanted to reach one of the investigators of a past accident, so I don't remember exactly which accident was mentioned. But there may be an easy solution to finding the staff that worked on an accident--even very old ones.

Each major accident and even interim recommendation letters are transmitted to the Board Members with an attached Notation Memorandum. At least I assume they still do it that way. The Notation Memorandum lists the staff who participated in the investigation. All someone has to do is pull up the PDF copy of the accident report online, search for the Notation number (usually found on a page near the front of the document), and then call the NTSB office that has the Notation memos on file (used to be the Executive Secretariat MD-5) and ask them to provide the list of staff names.

Now there is one caveat: the Notation Memorandum used to be designated "For Official Use Only" since it sometimes discussed issues or had statements that were not for public release because the whole document is considered a working internal draft until the Board adopts the report. The Notation Memo itself is not printed with the report and, to my understanding, was never releasable to the public. But I don't think the NTSB General Counsel or FOIA office would prevent NTSB staff from providing someone the list of names of investigators and others who were involved in the investigation.

It's worth a try. (I'll let those concerned work on this...)
