
A missive from **Don Chupp**:

Been a long time so I thought I would contribute a few things:

Since my time at the Board I've been passionately engaged in building an emergency services firm. It started out as just a one man consultancy gig initially for the business aviation sector. This was a gap I identified while working at the then NTSB Academy whereby so much of our stuff was airline focused. Attendees would come up and say "this is great but what about us.. we don't sell tickets to the public, we fly private families, business execs, or high visibility persons around." Truth be told we didn't have good solutions for them.

After hearing this concern several times I took the leap way back in early 2007 and haven't looked back since. I got a lot of wise counsel in the early days from some Silver Eagles like Greg Phillips and Keith McGuire. That was of immeasurable value. Fortunately we still get to work with the good folks at the Board, and I do miss the comradery.

The work here has developed into cross-modal services. One in particular is our 24/7 Emergency Operations Center which provides asset monitoring and anomaly identification services for over 135 private aviation, marine, commercial spacecraft, and even autonomous transportation providers. The mission is to identify first indicators of a problem, asses the seriousness of the problem, and then if required initiate an immediate response to that indicator. We want our clients to the first to know of an




emergency, not the media or the public. It's a really savvy service with a lot of tech behind it, and an opportunity for former ATC Controllers, USCG maritime specialists and others who have Ops Center experience.

The primary service end is to help an organization in the aftermath of an emergency to: take care of its people, communicate internally and externally with effect, and participate effectively with our former employer. We have a 45 person (and growing) humanitarian response team, and several in-house specialists in communications, emergency travel, human remains repatriation, and personal effects recovery and cleaning.

Malcolm Brenner sends in a family photo:


